## Learning Area Whakataukī:

## At Curriculum Level 6, students will...

- · explore different ways in which religions and belief systems are identified and classified
- · identify characteristics of belief systems
- explore diverse perspectives on spirituality and religious beliefs
- learn about religion and belief systems in local and global contexts
- explore the impact of religion on people, societies, and the environment
- learn about the dynamic and complex relationship between cultures, identities, and religions
- explore how Māori and Pacific knowledge bases influence the expression of religion
- learn about how historical and social contexts inform the development of significant religious narratives
- explore how belief systems and religious teachings are derived from significant narratives and texts
- understand that communities that share religious or spiritual beliefs are shaped by internal and external forces
- explore how belief systems have been influenced by historical events
- consider the influence of social migration on the development of communities that share religious or spiritual beliefs in Aotearoa New Zealand, Pacific Realm countries and the wider Pacific region
- understand the influence of significant people and their ideas, associated with religions
- consider responses from communities that share religious or spiritual beliefs to major events or social issues, national or international
- learn about how religious beliefs can be applied to ethical issues.
